## What is an Elitis Fire Escape Ladder?

The Fire Escape Ladder is a highly innovative yet simple device that is designed to save lives.

It has been designed as a permanent, but collapsible, safety ladder for emergency use in the event of fire in your home. It will help you and your family to escape quickly, easily and safely from an upper storey window in the event of all downstairs exits being blocked.

Once installed on an outside wall of your home, the fire escape folds away neatly and discreetly to resemble an unobtrusive rainwater downpipe. It is easily installed, fully weather resistant and secure.

We sincerely hope that you never have to use it! But we know that you will value it as a life saver if ever you need to escape a fire.

## How does it work?

The ladder has been designed to use simply and quickly.

In the event of fire, open the escape window and remove the cap from the top of the fire escape ladder.

Gravity takes over and the ladder opens at 90 degrees to the house.

A safe exit can now be made.

The Government recommendation is to throw cushions, bedding and soft furnishings out of the window to break your fall.

In reality we know that many people will not jump from a window but will instead wait for the Fire Services. This could be potentially fatal as smoke can be the main killer in a fire. The safest and best solution is to leave the building quickly.

### Fire death house was 'in disrepair'

AN elderly man told his son he did not need any electrical work doing on his house the day before he died in a fire at his home near Worcester, an inquest has heard.

Last year, the Worcester News reported how about 25 firefighters spent more than an hour battling the blaze at a house in Perry-croft Close, off Station Road, in Fennhill Heath, Worcester, on Thursday, November 23.

The body of 76-year-old David Williams, who lived alone, was later discovered in an upstairs room. A fire investigating officer found that the fire started in the bedroom at the front of the house which then lit the bed frame and mattress.

Neighbours were unable to reach the 31-year-old when fire broke out and she was trapped in her bedroom with her two dogs. Mystery surrounds death of mystery-of-three in Hartlepool house fire

MYSTERY deepened last night over the death of a woman in a house fire. Fire crews were called to the smart four-bedroom house at The Paddock, Elwick, near Hartlepool, on Friday after reports of a blaze in a garage. Flames had burned through the staircase at the property and firefighters had to use a ladder to get upstairs.

Denise Cutler, 43, was found unconscious and was treated at the scene for smoke inhalation. She died later in hospital, police said.

Fire death man named

\*THE man who died in a house fire off Pound Bank Road has been named. He is Richard Perkins, aged 37, of the Glade.

His partner, Rosanne Perkins, is in an intensive care, as is her daughter Katie, 17. Fire crews had 15 emergency calls to the fire in The Glade, Malvern, and people reported seeing residents trapped inside.

A total of 30 firefighters rushed to the scene at 1.30am today where they found 10ft high flames leaping out of the bedroom window. Ten firemen with breathing apparatus went into the terraced house, and two firefighters got into a bedroom via a window.

It was here they found Mr Perkins who had died in the fire.

Three teenagers have been arrested in connection with the death of a woman who died in a house fire started by a firework pushed through her door.

An 18-year-old man and two 17-year-old males, who are all from Bodmin, in Cornwall, are being held in custody awaiting interview. Mother-of-nine Mary Fox, 59, was trapped in her bedroom after reportedly pushing her 17-year-old son Raun to safety through an upstairs window after the fire broke out at around 7.15pm last Thursday. The remnants of a firework were found behind the front door of Mrs Fox's house in Carpenter Court, Wallase Road.
